		Pupils, staff and other adults should follow public health advice on when to self-isolate and what to do. They should not come into school if they have symptoms, have had a positive test result or other reasons requiring them to stay at home due to the risk of them passing on COVID-19 (for example, they are required to quarantine).	If a pupil is awaiting collection, they should be left in a room on their own if possible and safe to do so. A window should be opened for fresh air ventilation if possible. 		Clean surfaces that children and young people are touching, such as toys, books, desks, chairs, doors, sinks, toilets, light switches, bannisters, more regularly than normal.	All surfaces in areas of use will be disinfected daily with the cleaning products normally used. Paying particular attention to frequently touched areas and surfaces, such as toilets and washrooms, desks, grab-rails in corridors, stairwells and door handles.

		Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) to be used by staff as normally required for their role.	Most staff in schools will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for their work. The guidance on the use of PPE in education, childcare and children's social care settings provides more information on the use of PPE for COVID-19.		
Face Coverings	General note and if circumstances change	Face coverings are no longer advised for pupils, staff and visitors either in classrooms or in communal areas.  The government has removed the requirement to wear face coverings in law but expects and recommends that they are worn in enclosed and crowded spaces where you may come into contact with people you don't normally meet. This includes public transport and dedicated transport to schools.	If there is an outbreak in school, Public Health may advise you that face coverings should temporarily be worn in communal areas or classrooms (by pupils, staff and visitors, unless exempt). You should make sure your outbreak management plans cover this possibility.  In these circumstances, transparent face coverings, which may assist communication with someone who relies on lip reading, clear sound or facial expression to communicate, can also be worn. Transparent face coverings may be effective in reducing the spread of COVID-19. However, the evidence	All staff/ pupils	

	to support this is currently very limited.	
	Face coverings (whether transparent or cloth) should fit securely around the face to cover the nose and mouth and be made with a breathable material capable of filtering airborne particles.	
	Staff may choose to continue to wear face coverings in school while the infection rate is high in the local area.	

## Risk assessment

You must comply with health and safety law and put in place proportionate control measures. You must regularly review and update your risk assessments - treating them as 'living documents', as the circumstances in your school and the Public Health advice changes. This includes having active arrangements in place to monitor whether the controls are effective and working as planned.
