When a child has finished a book, they can inform their class teacher, who will then tick off their individual bingo card. At the end of the year, the class with the most completed cards will win a prize to celebrate.



1. Running Wild by Michael Morpurgo

For Will and his mother, going to Indonesia isn't just a holiday. It's an escape, a new start, a chance to put things behind them — things like the death of Will's father. And to begin with, it seems to be just what they both needed. But then Oona, the elephant Will is riding on the beach, begins acting strangely, shying away from the sea. And that's when the tsunami comes crashing in, and Oona begins to run. Except that when the tsunami is gone, Oona just keeps on running.



2. Five Children and It by E Nesbitt

Digging in the gravel pit on a hot summer's day, five children discover 'it': a strange, bad-tempered creature with eyes like a snail's, ears like a bat's, and a tubby body covered in fur. 'It' is an ancient sand-fairy who has the power to grant the children's wishes! They had often talked about what they might wish for, but when they are faced with a grumpy magical creature that actually does grant wishes, they find it difficult to make up their minds. That is just the beginning of their dilemmas. As they discover, there is nothing quite like a wish for getting you into terrible trouble!



3. Happy Here – Collection of short stories

With an introduction from bestselling author Sharna Jackson, Happy Here features stories and poems by 10 Black British authors, illustrated by Black British artists. It Explores themes of joy, home and family through a wide range of genres and styles.




4. Anne of Green Gables by L M Montgomery


5. The Figure in the Shadows by John Bellairs

6. The Magician's Nephew by C. S. Lewis



He knows how the story starts and he knows it's called Clockwork - so, with the snow swirling down outside, he sets his story

going and hopes for the best! Suddenly, Fritz's story takes on a life of its own - and just like clockwork it can't be stopped . . .




8. The Highwayman by Alfred Noyes

9. Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them – J K Rowling



10. Artemis Fowl by Eoin Colfer




2. Diary of a Killer Cat by Anne Fine


3. Fantastic Mr Fox by Roald Dahl

beloved city, Pompeii.




6. The Hundred Mile an Hour Dog by Jeremy Strong


7. Romans on the Rampage by Jeremy Strong


8. The Twits by Roald Dahl


Each page introduces a different animal, with a short read-aloud rhyme.




6. The Storm Whale by Benji Davies

has to go back to the sea where it belongs. For Noi, even though he can't keep it, the arrival of the whale changes his life for the better - the perfect gift from one friend to another.




7. The Bog Baby by Jeanne Willis


